About the Courses:

TASER RECERTIFICATION

This course is to serve as a Refresher for the CERTIFIED Taser User, discussing new information obtained from Axon in reference to the conducted electrical weapons (CEWs). Course content will include but not limited to firmware upgrades, maintenance, legal updates, and recent case law.

Students will participate in lecture/discussion as well as practical exercises, demonstrating loading and clearing drills, cartridge safety, probe placement, disconnect drills, drive stun, and deployment risk factors. Concluding with a scenario based live fire exercise to include a malfunction drill, and reload while under stress.

****EQUIPMENT THAT OFFICER MUST PROVIDE****

1. TASER "M26" or "X26" (At least one per department)
2. Three (per student) Police Air Cartridges (21 foot range)
3. Holster (if you have one)
4. Safety glasses
5. Latex gloves

HAZARDOUS MATERIALS REFRESHER **29CFR1910.120**



OSHA has issued a standard to limit occupational exposure to hazardous materials. The standard mandates work practices and employee training. Basic Awareness training is mandated for any officer that could be first on the scene of a hazardous materials incident. Hazardous materials training is provided by our academies in the Basic Recruit course. The Board offers through its MTUs both the full course and a refresher course. Both courses assist officers in meeting the required standard and remaining in compliance with this standard. OCCUPATIONAL EXPOSURE TO BLOODBORNE PATHOGENS STANDARD - 29CFR1910.1030



OSHA has issued a standard to limit occupational exposure to blood and other potentially infectious materials. The standard mandates engineering controls, work practices and personal protection equipment that, coupled with employee training, will reduce on-the-job risks. It should be noted that while Illinois is not an OSHA state, local government falls under the jurisdiction of IDOL who has adopted the OSHA standard in full. Opioid Overdose Response – Narcan Administration **Refresher**

Instructional Goal: Opioid overdose deaths have risen significantly in Illinois and nationally over the past few years. It has been determined that early intervention can help reduce fatalities. Police officers often interact with high risk populations and are often the first responder to medical emergencies. Training in Opioid overdose response is designed to educate officers in recognizing the signs of an Opioid overdose and how to administer intranasal naloxone hydrochloride (aka Narcan) in an attempt to reverse the effects of the overdose.

Student Performance Objectives:

1. Identify facts that lead to an opioid overdose
2. Recognize signs and symptoms of an opioid overdose
3. Demonstrate appropriate intervention method using intranasal naloxone hydrochloride (aka Narcan)
